In line with this, last October 7. the first day of distribution of tablets to the workers of the company for their children's online classes. A total of 42 tablets from the Alcatel (Alcatel IT 10) was properly distributed to the employees following the strict protocols on social distancing. wearing masks, and face shields. On the 11th of November 2020, Typhoon Ulysses lashed the main island of Luzon whipping destructive winds and dumping heavy rainfall that triggered massive flooding in several areas including, Region II (Cagavan Valley), which was one of the most severely affected. Most parts of Cagayan and Isabela submerged underwater as Magat Dam released water due to heavy rains. Because of these thousands of homes were destroyed, and also causing millions of infrastructural and agricultural damages.

WSMSI took part on one of the relief operations in Cagayan and Isabela initiated by the volunteers of University of La Salette Santiago headed by Ms. Ella Respicio. Vaccine Distribution: Philippines Dilemma

President Rodrigo Duterte expresses his desire to start the distribution of vaccines for the Coronavirus in the Philippines "sooner than the second quarter" of 2021 Palace spokesman Harry Roque Jr. said last December 3.

FDA chief and vaccine czar Eric Domingo said that the government aims to vaccinate around 60 million to 70 million of its citizens in 3 to 5 years. This number of people corresponds to roughly 60% to 70% of the country's 107 million population. Thus, they are ony capable of vaccinating only 20 million to 30 million Filipinos a year. This means that in 2024 to 2026, 60% of the population must have been vaccinated already.

This is not going to be an easy journey, though. A lot of conditions can be experienced when there is a coronavirus vaccine ready to be administered throughout the world. It is also very necessary for the Government to be properly informed and ready with the important items that need to be taken into account and to be sufficiently supported directly in the transport and delivery of vaccines to the intended beneficiaries.

The task ahead for the government is terrifying, but if the challenges involved are recognized in time, then there is an opportunity to work on solutions and immediate action.

We should assume that the government and the private sector are now starting to build the infrastructure required for the effective distribution and deployment of the vaccine to the general population.

Important dialogue and attention should be given towards investing in the Domestic production capability of syringes and other crucial elements of the cold chain system needed for the distribution of vaccines.

In response to claims that 60 million doses could be only an initial supply, and provided that there is still confusion as to the number of vaccine doses needed by a person, the demand for the vaccine will continue.


Perhaps the government can also continue to discuss the prospect of being part of the process of production for the vaccine. In this sense, we need to build local development capabilities and self-reliance. Let us learn the lessons given to the world and our nation by this pandemic, and take this opportunity to take brave, strategic action to resolve these obstacles and safeguard the future.

It has been almost a year now since the pandemic haunted us. States and nations across the world have done their best to combat this unseen enemy. And, without a vaccine, we will continue living in these steep spaces, where we most wonder about our safety and our families.

Here in the Philippines, we've been one of the countries that have the most number of infected cases. If there'd be no vaccine in the first or second quarter of next year, we cannot imagine the worst-case scenario. Our country has been struggling even before this pandemic. That's why we urgently need a vaccine to recuperate slowly -- on our economy, agriculture, industrial, and local industries that have been greatly impacted by this pandemic.

Safety Tips for Holiday Gatherings Amid Covid-19 Pandemic

Indoor gatherings, especially those with poor ventilation (for example, small enclosed spaces with no outside air), pose more risk than outdoor atherings.

- High or increasing levels of COVID-19 cases in the gathering location, as well as in the areas where attendees are coming from, increase the risk of infection and spread among attendees.
- Individuals who did not consistently adhere to social distancing, mask wearing, handwashing, and other prevention behaviors pose more risk than those who consistently practiced these safety measures.

Consumption of alcohol or drugs may alter judgment

and make it more difficult to practice COVID-19 safety

- Family, relatives and friends should consider the number of COVID-19 cases in their community and in the community where they plan to celebrate when deciding whether to host or attend a gathering.
- Celebrating virtually with members of your own

household poses the lowest risk for spread. This can

include family members, relatives and as well as

people who are related or unrelated to you.

measures

- It is suggested limiting the number of people that would attend certain gatherings or activities or limit from the same household.
- It is suggested to keep the activity as short as possible.
- Attendees must observe minimum health standards such as wearing a face mask, keeping physical listance, avoiding contact with "high-touch" surfaces, nd ensuring cleanliness.
- Gatherings that last longer pose more risk than shorter gatherings. Being within 2 meters of someone who has COVID-19 for a cumulative total of 15 minutes or more greatly increases the risk of becoming sick and recuires ouarantine.
- Airports, bus stations, LRT/MRT train stations, other public transport, gas stations are all places travelers can be exposed to the virus in the air and on surfaces.
- President Rodrigo Duterte urged the public to skip Christmas festivities this year for the safety of everyone amid the prevailing coronavirus disease 2019 (Covid-19) pandemic. He appealed to Filipinos to sacrifice holiday traditions this year to avoid spreading or catching the disease.

- The size of a holiday gathering should be determined based on the ability of attendees to stay 2 arm lengths apart, wear masks, wash hands, and follow Government, CDC DOH, local barangay health and safety guidelines, rules, and regulations.
- As Filipinos, gatherings during this Christmas holiday season is an opportunity to reconnect with family, relatives and friends that we possibly cannot be avoided. However, we must consider how our holiday plans can be modified to reduce the spread of COVID-19 to keep our families, relatives, friends and communities stay healthy and safe.

CDC and DOH have offered the following considerations to slow the spread of COVID-19 during gatherings especially this holiday season.
